Caparison / Tourney Cover

- Derived from the Latin word "Caparo", meaning cape.
- Cloth covering for animals (Horses, elephants, etc.).
- Popular in tournaments, parades, and other ceremonies during the13-17th centuries, throughout Europe.
- Full caparisons cover the animal entirely, and include hoods, front, and rear pieces.
- Partial caparisons cover the front and rear, but not the head or neck.
- Half caparisons cover the rear only.
 - A great way to start if you don't want to sew a full one.





French Style Cover:

- Two-piece construction
- Fitted front piece
- "Table cloth" like piece on the hind quarters
- Can have a hood, but not always.
- A pattern for this style and construction details are included in the back up slides.





Spanish and German Style Covers:

- Period patterns available in Enns and Leonfeldner master tailer books (16th century Austria)
- Both are fitted across hindquarters (not flowing like French style)
- Spanish has no hood
- German is one piece w/ hood attached
- No eye holes in German hood
- Ear holes?



Fabrics referenced in the Enns/ Leonfeldner Tailor Books:

Fabric Name	Description	Width
Daffet (Taffeta)	Plain lightweight silk fabric in simple tabby weave.	1/2 to 3/4 ell
Leinwat (Linen)	Basic linen with plain tabby or twill weave.	1 to 1.13 ell
Statt zendel (Silk)	Light silk fabric similar to veiling. Tabby weave.	1/2 ell
Post zendel (Silk)	Very sheer silk fabric (like a spider's web).	1/3 ell
Atlas of Bruges	Fabric with Silk warp and linen weft.	2/3 to 7/8 ell

Note - Tailors measured fabric with an "ell stick". The ell was not standardized and varied from town to town. The standard for Enns is 31". Leonfeldner's ell is identical to Enns.


- Pattern from Enns Tailor Book
- No Hood
- Fitted around hind quarters
- 3 ells long across horse (2 yd/ 21in)
- 18 ells (15yd / 16in) of ordinary daffett
- 6 ells (5yd / 6in) leinwat for lining

Spanish Style Pattern #2:

- Pattern from Leonfelder Tailor Book
- No Hood / Fitted around hind quarters
- 3 ells long and wide (2 yd/ 21in)
- 3 widths of daffett per one side
- 15 ells (12 yd/ 32 in) ordinary daffet
- Or 20 ells (17 yd / 6in) statt zendel
- Or 22 ells (18yd/ 31in) or post zendel
- 5 ells (4 yds / 11 in) leinwat for lining



German Style – Pattern #1:

- Pattern from Enns Tailor Book
- Requires twice as much fabric as Spanish Style due to hood being attached to the body.
- 3 ells long and wide (2 yd/ 21in) (w/o hood)
- 42 ells (36yd / 2in) of post Zendel
- Or 18 ells (15 yds / 16 in) of atlas of Bruges
- 8 ells (6yd / 32in) leinwat for lining

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German Style – Pattern #2:

- Pattern from Leonfeldner Tailor Book
- Also 3 ells long and wide (2 yd/ 21in) w/o the hood section.
- 30 ells (25yd / 27in) of statt zendel
- Or 16 ells (13yd/26in) of Atlas of Bruges
- Or 18 ells (15 yd / 16 in) of daffet
- Or 46 ells (39 yd / 17in) of post Zendel
- Or 26 ells (22 yd / 11 in) of Statt zendel
- 8 ells (6yd / 32in) leinwat for lining

Next Steps for me:

- Make a Spanish style cover for Bingo.
- Experiment with fastenings on front/ rear.
 - •Button closures? Ties?
 - •How far down to fasten without impeding motion?
- Eventually Try German Style?






Other patterns:

The rump piece is completely straight across the whole top.


The front piece is also straight across with no rise for withers.

The fit could be better.

Fabric considerations

- Will take 6-10 yards modern fabric depending on size of horse and if doing a hood. More if lining.
- 55-60" width is best.
- Make sure it is sturdy and machine washable.
 - It WILL get pooped on, dragged in the mud, etc.!
- To line, or not to line?
 - Consider climate
 - Will drape better, but will be hotter to wear.
- Avoid synthetic fabrics for better breathability.
- Don't use knits.

Construction Tips

- Cut two of each: Front and Back.
 - (Cut 4 if lining)
- Consider making a toile/muslin for the front half.
 - Does not take much fabric.
 - Mock up will allow you to adjust fit on equine, especially the neck curve.
- Sew along the top of each, front and back.
- If lining, I would sew the pieces together at the middle seam. Or alternatively, you could sew each separately and then sew/ connect them together along the top seam so the raw edges are hidden.
- I pressed the seams open and sewed a strip of bias tape over the raw edges to cover them and add strength.



Construction Tips (Cont.)

- Before you hem / finish the bottom...
 - Put the caparison on the equine.
 - Make sure it is centered.
 - Safety pin / secure the front so it is closed.
 - Have the horse stand on flat, level ground. (Ex: cement barn aisle)
 - Using a yard stick and some tailor's chalk, mark on the caparison where you want the hem to be.
 - Generally, the hock or knee is a good place to measure from.
 - On Bingo, this was 16" above the ground.
 - Mark all the way around.
 - Trim bottom where marked.



Construction Tips (Cont.)

FLAMINGO

- Fastest and easiest way to finish edges: use bias tape!
- Bias tape comes in large spools!
- No stopping and joining needed!
- Cheaper than pre-packaged tape.

IVORY

- 50-55 yard spools available online. \$15-\$20
- Bias Double Fold Tape 50 yards / 150 feet | Etsy
- <u>Bias Tape Doubled fold 1/2 Wide X 50 Yards</u> per Roll 100% | Etsy


Construction Tips (Cont.)

- Finish all edges with bias tape.
- Add ties to front chest piece.
 - Shoelaces
 - Twill tape
 - Grosgrain ribbon
- Add fitch w/ Velcro to front piece
- Sew Velcro on back piece



Useful tip for the fitch overlap connection:

Put velcro strips on the top side of the fitch piece (and underside of the back piece) to enable the caparison to fit a variety of horses.
